Key Topics

Date	Session	Details
1/26	Practice Session: OS consulting across the disciplines	This session will start with a brief introduction of the Organizational Science Consulting & Research (OSC&R) program. We will then have a discussion on how scholars from the different OS disciplines would approach an actual OS consulting project submitted to OSC&R.
2/16	Research Session: Student Research	Our very own OS students are invited to present their research. This session is designed to allow students to practice conference presentations and share current research with the broader OS community.
3/9	Integrating OS and Public Policy	This session will bring together the OS and Public Policy programs to discuss the overlaps across the two fields.
3/30	OS Research Session: Faculty Research	Some of our very own OS faculty will present their research. This session is designed to share the scholarly work going on in our program with the broader OS community.
4/13	Hot Topics	During this session, we will have a theoretically informed discussion on recent events and hot topics. This session is designed to harness the power of OS by comprehensively discussing and developing research questions around these events from an interdisciplinary perspective.
